National Health Service

- Refers to the Government-funded health care and medical services that people residing in the UK can use without paying for the full cost.
- Free at the point of use. Funding is collected through taxation.
- NHS governments in England, Wales and Scotland. Northern Ireland is called HSC or Health and Social Care Services.
- Officially opened in July 1948 in Manchester. Leaflet in 1948 states:
 - 'Everyone rich or poor, man, woman or child can use it or any part of it. There are no charges, except for a few items. There are no insurance qualifications. But it is not a "charity". You are all paying for it, mainly as taxpayers, and it will relieve your money worries in time of illness'

- Aspires to the highest standards of excellence and professionalism
- Aspires to put patients at the heart of everything




Clinical Governance

 "a system through which NHS organisations are accountable for continuously improving the quality of their services and safeguarding high standards of care by creating an environment in which

excellence in clinical care will flourish"

- Five key themes:
 - > Patient focus how services are based on patient needs
 - Information focus how information is used
 - >Quality improvement how standards are reviewed and attained
 - > Staff focus- how staff are developed
 - > Leadership how improvement efforts are planned.



The Francis Inquiry Report

- Published in 2013, it examined the causes of failings in care at Mid Staffordshire NHS
 Foundation Trust
- What happened in Mid Staffs?
 - A higher than average mortality rate were noted from Trust due to poor care over 50 months.
 - Examples of poor care: patients unwashed for a month; patients receiving pain relief late or not at all;
 poor standards of hygiene; misdiagnosis; ignored calls for help
- Made 290 recommendations:
 - Openess, transparency and candour throughout the health care system, fundamental standards for health care providers
 - o Improved support for compassionate caring and committed care and stronger health care leadership.
- Freedom to Speak-up guardian
 - Ensures that staff can raise concerns about patient-safety
 - Creating an <u>open</u> and <u>honest</u> reporting culture in the NHS
